It's official. Phoenix is #5. Phoenix, Arizona is the fifth most populated city in the country and #1 in population growth according to the U.S. Census Bureau. That's quite an achievement, and one that according to pundits has significant <u>positives</u> as well as some <u>challenges</u>. And as I noted in <u>my recent op-ed</u> in the Arizona Republic and <u>comments</u> by Chris Mackey, our city's Community and Economic Development Director, our downtown has played a big part in Phoenix's resurgence in terms of business development and quality of life. A denser, more populated urban core that takes advantage of our built infrastructure costs taxpayers less and is more sustainable.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS

<u>Quicken Loans</u> is considering locating downtown pending a Phoenix City Council decision on <u>parking and transit incentives</u>. <u>Splash</u>, a New York City-based event marketing firm, is hiring staff and moving downtown. As told in the pages of USA Today, <u>Phoenix's tech</u> <u>scene</u> is growing in its historic downtown warehouse district.

Residential development continues to be on everyone's minds, from what's proposed for <u>Arizona Center</u>, who's moving to <u>downtown condos</u> (millennials and baby boomers), who's getting <u>Government Property Lease Excise Tax</u> (GPLET) incentives, and where the <u>most expensive and affordable</u> rental units are located.

<u>Three new hotels</u> mean hundreds of new guest rooms, and Phoenix officials hope these and more hotels in the planning stages mean <u>more conventioneers and visitors</u>. Indicative of an upswing in convention activity has been Phoenix Comicon and <u>National</u> <u>Council of La Raza Annual Conference</u>.

Congratulations to the team that designed and constructed the University of Arizona's <u>Biomedical Sciences Partnership Building</u> for receiving the 2017 North American Copper in Architecture Award. Congrats also to <u>Co+Hoots and Galvanize</u> for being named #4 and #12 respectively on Inc. Magazine's list of the top 23 coworking spaces in the U.S. And happy 25th anniversary to <u>Talking Stick Resort Arena</u>.

FOODIE NEWS

In happy news: <u>State 48 Brewery and Brewpub</u> is opening in the historic Welnick Building on W. Van Buren. <u>Press Coffee</u> at Central and McDowell is opening. The shuttered Roosevelt Tavern space in Evans Churchill is being reborn as <u>The Monocle</u> <u>Restaurant</u>. The popular <u>CultivEAT Farm-to-Table Dinner</u> in Evans Churchill was held for the third year. And Flagstaff-based <u>SoSoBa Noodle Shop</u> gains popularity at its Roosevelt Row location. In sad news: <u>Pizza People Pub</u> on North Central and Tom's Tavern at Central and 1st Avenue have closed, but you could <u>buy a bit of history from Tom's</u>.

<u>Farmers markets</u>, like the Downtown Phoenix Public Market at Central and Pierce, are blooming. <u>Vegans and vegetarians</u> have more dining options in Downtown Phoenix and statewide. More local restaurants are participating in <u>Arizona Restaurant Week</u> as Downtown Phoenix's reputation as a <u>burgeoning culinary hot spot</u> grows.

CARING COMMUNITY

As a caring and compassionate community, individuals, non-profit organizations, public servants, and businesses continue to tackle pressing issues:

Homelessness. While more homeless are being placed in housing, the Valley has seen a <u>surge in homeless camps</u>. Helping to alleviate the problem, <u>St. Vincent de Paul</u> broke ground on their homeless campus expansion and the <u>Justa Center</u> is addressing the increase in older homeless individuals.

The Environment. The City of Phoenix could require space for <u>recycling bins</u> at new apartments. After the financial difficulties of The Great Recession, the city and community are redoubling efforts to <u>replenish the city's tree canopy</u> as called for in the Council-approved Tree and Shade Master Plan. Sometimes it starts with <u>one young entrepreneur</u> with a love of plants to encourage others. And anyone out there with significant "green" achievements is encouraged to nominate their project for an Arizona Forward 2017 Environmental Excellence Award. <u>The application deadline is 4 p.m. on July 7</u>.

Food Desert. Helping to alleviate the lack of healthy food options for residents are <u>public</u> <u>markets</u>, grocery stores in central locations (like the proposed<u>Fry's Grocery Store</u> in downtown Phoenix), and innovations like <u>Don's Fresh Express</u> mobile produce store.

OUR LOCAL ARTS SCENE


